In collaboration with the Hudson River Museum as the Spring/Summer 2024 Teaching Artist In Residence, MorDance eagerly anticipates participating in multiple public events and performances inspired by the exhibition Rivers Flow/Artists Connect.

MorDance will kick off its first Yonkers performance season from April 30 to May 4, followed by its long-standing NYC season at New York Live Arts in Manhattan. It symbolizes a new era of artistic exploration, heightened community engagement, and the fulfillment of our mission to make dance accessible to all. We are opening our rehearsals to the public regularly in Yonkers and envision launching a series of free outdoor performances in the summer of 2024. MorDance is thrilled to extend its outreach programs into the Yonkers and Westchester communities while maintaining our current initiatives in NYC. MorDance's unwavering commitment to accessibility and outreach remains a driving force in our journey. I express my deepest gratitude to each one of you for being integral to MorDance's ongoing success. 



What

MorDance is a trailblazing, women-led ballet company striving to advance accessibility, diversity, and creativity in ballet by fostering empowered environments for artistic expression. Since launching in 2013, we have embodied our mission to break free of ballet's historically homogenous structures by creating groundbreaking original works, centering underrepresented voices and contemporary narratives, and leading youth outreach initiatives serving thousands of students in under-resourced communities across New York City.

Why

As reported by a study funded by the National Endowment for The Arts, empirical evidence supports claims that engaging with art is essential to the human experience. Among adults, arts participation is related to behaviors that contribute to the health of civil society such as increased civic engagement, greater social tolerance, and reductions in other-regarding behavior.

A 2019 study conducted by the Brookings Institution and Houston's Arts Access Initiative found that a substantial increase in arts educational experiences among students has a remarkable impact on students' academic, social, and emotional outcomes. Relative to students assigned to the control group, treatment school students experienced a 3.6 percentage point reduction in disciplinary infractions, an improvement of 13 percent of a standard deviation in standardized writing scores, and an increase of 8 percent of a standard deviation in their compassion for others. In terms of measuring compassion for others, students who received more arts education experiences were more interested in how other people feel and more likely to want to help people who are mistreated.

How

MorDance serves a vibrant community of art enthusiasts across New York City representing an array of cultural and socioeconomic backgrounds. Our commitment to accessibility encapsulates a wide audience from long-standing patrons of ballet to those who have yet to be introduced to the genre. We are able to reach under-resourced populations through a strong network of outreach partners that have been consistently expanding since our launch. We are proud to partner with longstanding community organizations and public institutions serving marginalized, disenfranchised, and at-risk youth. In 2022, MorDance worked with eleven organizations including STEM From Dance, Bronx Academy of Music, Ballet and Beyond, PS 23, Ps 127, and PS 110 who are essential in facilitating our youth outreach initiatives.

MorDance believes that achieving artistic excellence is not only to combine technical prowess with innovative expression but to consistently articulate beyond words a notion that is deeply felt, no matter the background or lived experience of the spectator. Our works of ballet compassionately welcome viewers into each story. Every year MorDance moves towards the goal of artistic excellence through our capacity to engage, inspire, and empower a diversity of audiences.

IN-SCHOOL STUDENT WORKSHOPS

At MorDance, we are committed to fostering a truly inclusive landscape for ballet and the performing arts. We recognize that to achieve this, it is essential to nurture the creative expression of young individuals who face barriers to accessing the arts. We firmly believe that youth engagement starts with providing opportunities for personal discovery, igniting a sense of wonder, and facilitating meaningful experiences. By empowering young people to explore their artistic potential, we aim to cultivate a generation that values diversity, embraces creativity, and contributes to the vibrant tapestry of the arts.



This program was specifically designed to enrich students' experiences with the arts in New York City. It featured two captivating ballets—one addressing the urgent issue of plastic pollution's impact on the albatross population, and the other inspired by the profound works of Emily Dickinson. These thought-provoking performances offered a powerful and engaging experience for the students.

We were fortunate to have Vicki Ferrini, a geoscientist from Columbia University's Lamont Center, as our special guest speaker. Her enlightening discussion on climate justice and her ongoing global ocean floor mapping project created a meaningful connection to our ballet about the albatross. Additionally, the students had the opportunity to observe our dedicated stage crew in action, enjoy live music, and actively engage in discussions with the entire MorDance team. Through dance, we have witnessed time and time again the transformative power it holds in building confidence and opening doors to success in the arts and beyond.


